A monthly royalty fee of R228 per laptop is payable by all licensees for the duration of the five-year renewable contract. This fixed monthly royalty is easily recovered from just one learner, according to Pengelly.

Levine says that by using the four laptops provided as part of the package and presenting hourly lessons to a maximum of 80 learners a week, entrepreneurs can potentially earn R20 000 a month, working for four hours a day, five days a week.

He says Computers 4 Kids does not dictate the hourly or monthly rate to be charged by licensees but can offer guidance on this. This exciting business opportunity is not only geared towards empowering entrepreneurs, but also the community in general.
